# Annual Report of the Council for the year ended 31 December 1976 and accounts for the year ended 30 September 1976



1976 has been a very much better year than might have been expected, although if one looks below the surface there are a number of areas of cause for anxiety. The following highlights the more important events of the year.

The Council has directed its endeavours throughout the year in such a way as to ensure the greatest possible economy without destroying the foundations on which the Institute was built. Successful results have followed from endeavours to provide new substantial sources of profitable revenue. Some of these are short term such as the high level of activity in the Middle East with particular emphasis on the provision of technical information from the library through Marine Activities Management Limited and MARLIB. Another is the planned high intensity use of the hire of conference facilities on the first floor of the Mark Lane building on those occasions when the Institute is not using them itself.

Gratitude is expressed to the members who have accepted yet another increase in the annual subscription and to those in particular who have adopted the direct debit method of payment which, with the ever-rising cost of money and the ever-present cash flow problems, has been of the inestimable value. The sum total of all

this has turned a deficit into a surplus and as is suggested in the financial paragraph of the Report has made possible the foundation of a special fund to take some account of possible problems in 1979 (unless the property market improves) consequent upon the falling in of the tenants' leases in Mark Lane.

The re-organization of CEI has been completed with the submission to Her Majesty's Privy Council of a Resolution seeking changes in the Charter and By-Laws to bring the agreed new organization into operation.

Council extends its best wishes to the new institution inaugurated in Canada, the Canadian Institute of Marine Engineers. This organization has been created as a result of a wish by members resident in Canada that they should have their own sovereign society and it is hoped that the determined collaboration between the Canadian society and the Institute will bring benefit to both.

Mr. G. Victory succeeded Mr. T. Kameen as President and Mr. G. McNee was elected Deputy President. Mr. J. McNaught was re-elected to serve as Honorary Treasurer.

Mr. and Mrs. T. Kameen were presented with mementos of

Mr. Kameen's term of office as President in 1975 at the Presidential Address in October.

During the year there became a casual vacancy for a second Associate Member of Council when the number of Associate Members of the Institute reached 1000. This casual vacancy will be filled at the Annual General Meeting in 1977.

To help to meet the effects of inflation, the subsistence and travel allowances for members of Council were amended, it being agreed that all Council and Committee travel would in general be at second-class rate.

The Council Dining Club was reactivated and held its first

Ine Council Dining Club was reactivated and field its first luncheon in the new building in July. A dinner was organized following the Council meeting on 24 November.

Vice-Admiral Sir George Raper ceased to be Honorary Vice-President for the Royal Navy upon his retirement from the Service and Rear Admiral P. R. Marrack, R.N., C.Eng., F.I.Mar.E., has been elected to serve in this capacity.

### DIVISIONS AND BRANCHES

## Australia/New Zealand Division

The Division held a Divisional Conference and two-day Symposium in Melbourne, on 15 and 16 September, on "Modern Diesel Propulsion Today" at which papers from eight different countries were presented.

## Indian Division

The Director and Secretary attended a meeting of the Indian Division in Bombay on 15 January after visiting all the branches in India. The meeting agreed a target of forming The Institute of Marine Engineers India by 1 January 1977, with a maximum development period by mutual agreement of two years, in the intervening period resuscitating the Indian Division of the Institute with the Branches continuing to function as such. The Division with the Branches continuing to function as such. The Division appointed an Executive and a working party was set up, its convenor being Mr. T. M. Sanghavi. The Indian Division office was reactivated and Council agreed a sum of Rs. 10 000 to run the Division during 1976/77.

Following the Divisional Conference in December 1975, Council agreed to help in any way with the establishment of the Canadian Institute of Marine Engineers. Detailed proposals for this were discussed by the Canadian Working Party in February and finally agreed by Council, after a Canadian Divisional meeting, which was attended by the Director and Secretary, in Ottawa on 22 April. A successful application was made to the Canadian Government for incorporation of the new organization, The Canadian Institute of Marine Engineers, which was granted on 23 April 1976. The Institute and the Canadian Institute agreed that provision would be made for new entries to the Canadian Institute automatically to become members of the Institute, such membership being limited to the provision of practical services and also that subscription collection, on behalf of those individuals who were members of both institutions, would be by the Canadian Institute, the appropriate amount being transferred to London. However, the Institute's implementation of the By-Law amending the membership year and the consequent decision to collect a nine months subscription for 1977 necessitated the Institute collecting its own subscriptions. Council wishes the new Institute well and hopes that close association will be beneficial to both organizations.

Much gratitude is due to Mr. T. M. Pallas for all his work as the Secretary for Canadian Affairs during the past 17 years.

COUNCIL REPRESENTATIVES

Mr. Frank Menzies was appointed Council Representative in the Caribbean, Mr. O. Rooney in Townsville, New South Wales, and Mr. B. M. Moloney in Cairns, New South Wales.

The system of funding U.K. branches was amended to revert to a two-part system of a basic grant of £100, together with a per capita grant of 50p, in the hope that this would alleviate some of the financial difficulties being encountered by the smaller Branches, Special cases for financial assistance had been made during the financial year by some smaller Branches as a result of which the Institute met some deficits shown in U.K. Branches' accounts at the end of the financial year 1974/75.

### Arab Branch

In April a new branch was inaugurated in the Middle East, based in Egypt. To mark the inauguration of the Arab Branch of the Institute, a four-day conference was held in Alexandria. The conference, which was opened by the Egyptian Minister of Maritime Transport, was attended by the Director and Secretary of the Institute, Mr. J. Stuart Robinson.

### Hong Kong

A joint branch has been formed between the Institute and the Royal Institution of Naval Architects in Hong Kong.

Additions and amendments to the Singapore branch rules were approved by Council, particularly to comply with the Registrar of Societies in Singapore. The branch organized a most successful seminar on Marine Technology from 4-6 November.

The joint branch of the Institute and the Royal Institution of Naval Architects in Pakistan was inaugurated at the beginning of the year.

The U.K. Branch Honorary Officers held their annual meeting at the Institute on Friday, 12 March.

The Council is most grateful to all the honorary officers in branches throughout the world for their enthusiasm and untiring efforts in promoting the Institute and its activities.

Full reports of the activities of the Divisions and Branches are published separately.

### FINANCE AND ACCOUNTS

During the year, in which inflation was running between 26 per cent and 16 per cent, the Institute's costs rose by only 7·3 per cent which contributed substantially to the turn-round from a £17 073 deficit, last year, to a surplus of £14 707, after creating a special reserve fund, on the capital account, to provide for any special reserve fund, on the capital account, to provide for any unknown or unexpected financial problems which may occur during 1979, consequent upon the expiry of the tenants' leases at the beginning of that year. As it is predicted by all the economic signs in the U.K. that an inflation rate of 15 per cent can be expected in 1977, it will be seen that complacency must not be allowed and that the close surveillance of costs, that has been exercised by the Council and staff in 1976, must continue. This exercise must also include an examination of the suitability of some of the current services possibly even the greation of new ones more in line with the services, possibly even the creation of new ones more in line with the conditions of today.

Income from members' subscriptions increased by 24 per cent (£60 616). Rents received showed an increase of £53 346, mainly derived from additional rents of £38 000 and extra service charges of £12 486, with garage rents contributing an extra £1267. Cost of services, in which rates (local taxes) play a big part, have increased by £30 179.

Publications have not quite maintained the position achieved in 1974/75, for, while advertising revenue has increased by £7 ·1 per cent), services sales have decreased this year by £3 669  $(6 \cdot 0 \text{ per cent})$ . Direct costs have been held down to an increase of £2 869. It is perhaps helpful, when considering the static position on publications, to bear in mind that the economic climate in the U.K. did not show any appreciable improvement during 1975/76, which must have affected advertising budgets and thus the Institute's income. It can be expected that the recession in U.K. trade for 1976/77 will not greatly alter from that which occurred in 1975/76, therefore very close monitoring of the way publications are progressing during the coming months will be mounted.

During the year £5 825 was awarded in Educational Grants, an increase of £425 over 1974/75.

Professional services were 8.2 per cent (£4 608) up on 1974/75, of which the expenditure on Divisions and Branches accounted for £3 251.

The Balance Sheet shows that Net Current Assets reflect the improved cash flow situation during 1975/76, particularly an increase of cash in hand of £68 584. It was not felt to be propitious to enlarge the Quoted Securities by further investment, because of the uncertain climate in industry.

The Capital Development Fund referred to earlier has been set up also to insure against the increases in interest rates in U.K., which directly affect the Institute's indebtedness to Merchant

Members will be aware that the Council has been acutely sensitive to the monitoring of costs during the year under review and the result fully justifies Council's determination in this respect. It is interesting to note that the "Excess of Expenditure over Income from Members" figure of £14 192 compares with the fact that if explosivitions had not been increased that forms would that, if subscriptions had not been increased, that figure would have been £74 808. Income from other sources would not have absorbed this and the future of the Institute would have been bleak

Nevertheless, one result such as 1975/76 should not be allowed to colour attitudes and to bring complacency. In the short term, as well as the long run, it is essential that future years show surpluses of figures at least similar to 1975/76. At the same time, members must appreciate that the internal organization has been costed to a fine degree and that it has now reached the point where no further good would come from cutting back in this area. In fact rather the reverse, because any further economy must reduce the ability to carry out the actual purposes for which the Institute exists.

The proposed revisions to the By-Laws, which were approved by the members at the Annual General Meeting in April, copies of the proposed revisions having been circulated in the March issue of M.E.R., have been approved by the Privy Council, subject to minor and (mainly editorial) amendments. The revisions will be brought into effect as applicable.

The By-Law aligning the membership year of the Institute with the financial year is being implemented and it has been agreed that the rates of subscription for the 9 months from 1 January 1977 will


Subscriptions for those members retired from remunerative service will be £5.50 with publications, or £4.00 without publica-tions. Subscriptions for those in Bangladesh, Pakistan, Sri Lanka and India will be the same for Consociates below the age of 22 and retired members, but £12.00 for other classes. The registration fee for automatic receipt of Transactions will be £2.00 per annum from 1 January 1977.

It is disappointing that, for the second successive year, there A new method of compiling the membership, this year a net loss of 437. A new method of compiling the membership statistics has been introduced and this has brought to light an accumulative error in those prepared in preceding years. An amendment, which is of the order of 1 per cent, has been made and is shown under the heading "Adjustment for prior years". The net result of this is that the 437 loss is reduced to 219. A total of 724 new members were elected and 106 transformed to another elegated. and 196 transferred to another class. Unhappily, however, there were 456 resignations, of whom 234 were Corporate members, 124 being over 60 years of age and 97 over 65, 630 members were deleted for non-payment of subscription and the total loss during the year, including those who died, was therefore, 1161. It was encouraging that a high proportion of elections were from overseas, including 80 from Egypt, presumably as a result of the newly formed Arab Branch. Despite fears that recruitment to the Associate Manual and the subscription of the subscription and the total loss during the year. Member class might fall as a result of those holding the First Class Certificate of Competency not being accepted for Corporate membership, it has not proved to be the case and the elections to the Associate Member class have been second only in numbers to those to Consociate.

The study group, set up to consider the membership trends within the Institute, circulated questionnaires to various membership groups and made comments, suggestions and recommendations as a result, in particular that the membership structure should be as a result, in particular the the interesting structure should be reappraised, considering the possibility of having a simplified structure with one, or at most two, classes of membership. It was recommended that a new approach be made to the Privy Council to permit the fuller use of designatory letters. The viability of student membership from both the Institute's and the individual student's viewpoint was questionable. Further investigations into

### MEMORIAL BUILDING

The reconstructed and rearranged accommodation, consisting of Lecture Hall, public rooms and Marine Engineers Club, on the first floor, has been in use throughout the year, accommodating most of the Institute meetings and being increasingly used by out-side organizations to the benefit of the Institute.

The ability to cater for up to 185 people with a great deal of flexibility in the available accommodation on the first floor has contributed to a far greater use of the Institute's building, and it is most encouraging that so many members should come to Mark

### Marine Activities Management Limited

The MARLIB information service formed the basis for certain overseas activities at the expense of encouraging subscribers. The most important of these was a visit to the Middle East, where in Basrah, Kuwait and Bahrain contacts were established, in particular with the Academy for Maritime Studies in Basrah. A steady income from technical enquiries, book sales and photocopying service operated by MARLIB has been maintained.

The Chairman of the Board, Mr. W. McClimont, resigned

during the year and the Company Secretary, Miss E. G. Overton, left the Institute's employ.

# TECHNICAL MEETINGS AND CONFERENCES

The first meeting in the modernized lecture hall was held on January and grateful thanks were sent to the Royal Institution of Naval Architects for their hospitality and loan of their comfortable facilities during the period of alterations to the Institute. During the year 12 meetings and 4 conferences, including the three and a half day IMAS 76 conference on "The Effect of Energy Supply on World Shipping", were held.

### **PUBLICATIONS**

A contract for printing Marine Engineers Review, which had been undertaken by St. Stephen's Bristol Press Limited, was given to Blackfriars Press Limited, of Leicester, from the July issue onwards, St. Stephen's Bristol Press Limited continue to print Transactions.

### M.E.R.-Marine Engineers Review

It was not an easy year for any of the marine publications. Steps initiated last year to make MER fully commercial were further implemented and included a tight control over the ratio of advertisements to editorial, the cancellation of the abstracts, for which there was little demand, and the removal of Branch and membership news from the MER which is now provided instead as an I.Mar.E. news loose insert.

The October issue contained a special feature on compressed air, aimed at the reader who wanted a short review of the growing uses of compressed air in ships and on offshore structures. It is planned to produce similar special features bi-monthly.

## Technical Reports (Transactions)

Transactions have been re-named Technical Reports, which is more explicit and at the same time should improve sales to nonmembers, an important source of revenue.

Series A contain the papers presented normally at evening meetings, which are available free to members on request.

Series B contain the papers presented at conferences, members qualifying for the reduced price.

### SALES AND ADVERTISING

Sales

In total, publications sales have shown some fall off. While Technical Reports (Transactions) have maintained an increasing sales trend, books have not met with the hoped for demand. To some extent last year was exceptional with the availability of M.E.P. Volume 1, for which a substantial demand had accrued during 1974. Sales to students through training establishments were also higher than normal. As many titles have passed peak sale and become dated, future sales expansion will depend on new titles. The main problem continues to be to get the Institute's services better known throughout the world and to find agents who will actively sell the Institute's books abroad, in particular *Technical Reports* which are a unique source of up-to-date technical information of use to libraries and research organizations.

Advertising

The small increase in MER advertisement revenue, during a difficult year for international shipping, reflects the status and authority of the journal. Extension of representation in certain overseas countries is being actively pursued and the support given to advertisement representatives has been greatly strengthened. Classified advertising has been actively pursued and shows an encouraging trend. Members can assist by recommending MER as an advertising medium and seeking inclusion of the journal in their own company's advertising media schedules, wherever possible.

### WEST EUROPEAN CONFERENCE ON MARINE TECHNOLOGY

The provisional conference programme for the second conference, organized jointly by the Western European institutions of naval architects and marine engineers, has been agreed and the conference on "Safety at Sea" will take place in London in May

A Tenth Anniversary Banquet was held at Guildhall in February, at which was announced the establishment of the Fellowship of Engineering, a body of engineers of the highest eminence.

A new Supplemental Charter and By-Laws were approved by the Board at the end of September and a newly structured profession has been set up. The Institution of Electrical Engineers have now officially withdrawn their notice to resign from the Council. A re-structured regional organization is one of the principal new features, and Captain W. S. C. Jenks is to be congratulated on his energetic and time consuming efforts to stimulate and establish this structure, as Chairman of the Working Committee and later of the Standing Committee for regional affairs. The new constitution will result in CEI comprising individual Chartered Engineers and corporate bodies, including non-chartered affiliate bodies, and provides for free national elections of individual chartered engineers to the Board, together with nominated chartered engineering institution representatives

The results of the 1975 Survey of Professional Engineers were published, the Steering Committee being chaired by Mr. B. Hildrew. The report covered trade union membership of professional engineers for the first time and one of the main findings was that the increase in income of professional engineers, in the two-year period up to April 1975, showed a reduction in the real value of

income over the whole profession.

In January CEI published a 12-page report on professional engineers and trade unions.

It was announced in December that the MacRobert Award, consisting of £25 000 and a gold medal, would not be given in 1976.

Commander M. B. F. Ranken, R.N., was Chairman of the British National Committee on Ocean Engineering.

Engineers Registration Board

Dr. J. Cowley served as Chairman of the Technician Engineer

Board and was re-elected for a second term of office.

Mr. G. R. Hodge has been elected Chairman of the Technician Section, having served as its Vice-Chairman the previous year. At 30 September, 44 institutions were in membership of the Technician Engineer Section and 31 institutions of the Technician Section. The registers of Technician Engineers and Technicians have continued to increase and approximately 70 per cent of eligible persons in the member institutions have now been registered.

The death of Mr. Stanley Caselton, Secretary of the Institution

of Production Engineers, is recorded with regret.

### EDUCATION AND TRAINING

During the year, the Professional Affairs and Education Committee discussed methods by which an integrated system of education could be presented to young marine engineers, so that, in the course of their training, they would have the opportunity to attain the academic level best suited to their own needs and abilities. By the end of the year, the proposals were nearing the stage where they could be offered for discussion with other organizations.

Discussions have been initiated with the organizers of the Sealife Programme, organized under the direction of the General Council of British Shipping.

### INSTITUTE GRANTS FOR EDUCATION PURPOSES

During the year, 24 students taking the marine engineering degree course at the Universities of Newcastle and Surrey, and 12 taking the Extra First Class Certificate course at the technical colleges of Hackney (Poplar Centre), South Shields and Glasgow, were in receipt of Institute grants.

### HONORARY LIFE MEMBERS

Those Honorary Life Members elected in 1975, who were able to be present, attended a luncheon of the Council Dining Club on Wednesday, 14 July, and were presented with their certificates.

### Valuation:

In the opinion of Richard Saunders & Partners, Chartered Surveyors, the capital value of the Institute's leasehold interest as at 31st December, 1976, for balance sheet purposes is at or about a figure of £5,000,000.
