## Annual Report of the Council and accounts for the year ended 30 September 1978



The report for the year ended 30 September 1978 indicates that the Institute's affairs during the current twelve months have reached a watershed, being between a period of financial restraint for the previous three years and hopefully one less restricting for the forthcoming year. This presumes that the negotiations for the sub-leases of the Memorial Building (referred to last year as under negotiation) will be satisfactorily concluded from which it follows that the Institute's income from this source would be increased substantially. It has been a matter of great concern to the Council that the existing leases were possibly going to terminate at a moment when the office property market in the City was in a state of ebb. At the time of writing, nearly all negotiations have been finalised and, so far as the remaining few are concerned, there is every prospect of these being settled in the near future.

The year under review therefore has been one of consolidation following on from the last few years of difficulty but also one for devoting time to planning for the future with the accent on expansion and development. A number of ideas are being pursued and

in due course reports will be made to the members.

Mr. D. H. Alexander succeeded Mr. G. McNee as President and Mr. J. McAfee was elected Deputy President. Mr. J. McNaught was re-elected to serve as Honorary Treasurer.

COUNCIL

Following the change in the structure of the Institute's management, the Council has received regular reports from the Council Advisory Committee and Marine Management (Holdings) Limited. Details of the work carried out by these bodies are given under

separate headings.

In April consideration was given to the new By-Laws at the Annual General Meeting, but to date there has been no reply from the Privy Council. The Council consider it an important step for the future development of the Institute that members other than chartered engineers should play a full part in the management of the Institute's affairs except in such matters as relate to chartered engineers rights and membership of CEI.

During the year two casual vacancies were filled. Mr. C. Barclay filled the casual vacancy as a Fellow and Mr. E. J. S. Agius

as a Member of Council.

Captain W. S. Jenks resigned as a Vice-President for personal reasons and the Council had much pleasure in appointing him an Honorary Vice-President. The Council would like to place on record an expression of thanks for the support rendered by Captain Jenks, and, in particular, for the CEI work he has carried out on behalf of the Institute.

The Councils of the Royal Institution of Naval Architects and the Institute have recently agreed to set up a joint working party consisting of five to six members from each Council, together with the Secretaries, with the following terms of reference:
"To consider, and report to Council on:—

How our two Institutions' efforts might be developed to advantage in dealing with the many problems we have to face in a period of rapid and fundamental change, not only in the industries in which our members serve, but also in the economic and technological environment we all share as a common experience.

The investigation, which may take some time, will, it is hoped, lead to recommendations for consideration by the respective

Councils.

Any member of the Institute who would like to make a comment or contribution within the terms of reference of the working party should write to the Director and Secretary, indicating whether there would be any objections to his or her letter being published in the correspondence columns of the M.E.R.

Deaths during the year are published regularly in the Marine Engineers Review.

It is with the deepest regret that the death of Dr. A. W. Davis, Past President of the Institute, is recorded.

Australia New Zealand Division

In January 1978 a Divisional Secretary's report was received which forms the basis of this report subject to up-dating where necessary. The committee working on the "Work and Knowledge Analysis for Marine Engineering" completed phase 1 and 2. The final phase, for the compiling of the syllabus, is now being undertaken by the Naval College, Launceston, which College has been

specially built for the training of Marine Engineers.

The consultative document "Proposed Structure of Licences for the Australian Merchant Service and Commercial Fishing Vessels" was under consideration and the Secretary indicated that the "Title/Certificate" for the Certificates of Competency and the use of the word "Licence" for the document issued for other grades had been retained after pressure from the Institute's representative on this point.

The Divisional Secretary visited New Zealand and attended a meeting at each of the branches and at the sub-branch at Dunedin. The meetings were well attended and the level of discussion was

Arrangements have been put into effect whereby copies of classified advertisements contained in the M.E.R. are sent to the

Division by airmail.

The Western Australia Branch and the New South Wales Branch both held very successful symposiums.

Arrangements have been made to hold a Divisional Council meeting in Auckland in February 1979. The President and Director and Secretary will attend this meeting.

India Division

A meeting was held in Bombay which was attended by representatives of various branches of the India Division. Following this meeting it was agreed to resuscitate the India Council Division and provisional arrangements were made for the financing of the Division and Branches.

There are various proposals under discussion at the time of writing and it is hoped that it will be possible to provide further services for members in India including the provision of a divisional office. It is also hoped that the Institute may be able to help in the provision of library facilities, thereby giving the Division a physical

BRANCHES

In a continuing effort to foster the development of branch activities, Council have agreed to increase the branch grants to £100 basic grant and £1.00 per capita with effect from 1 October 1978. Financial considerations, however, did not prove an inhibiting factor in the year under review, and branch activities have been at a high level.

The inaugural meeting of the Aberdeen Maritime Branch was held on 21 September 1978 and four meetings are planned for the current session. Since the year end the branch has held its first

Annual General Meeting.

During the year Branches have continued to hold regular meetings and it is hoped that these activities can be further encouraged.

EEC COLLOQUIUM

A meeting was held in Brussels on 11 October 1978 which was attended by various representatives of marine engineering institutions from other EEC countries. The discussion proved fruitful and encouraging, and it was agreed that a colloquium of European Marine Technological Institutions be formed.

#### FINANCE AND ACCOUNTS

After several years of financial restraint the Institute achieved a six figure surplus (£115 048) on the Revenue Account for the second year in succession. This enabled the Institute to make a considerable contribution from its own funds to Phases 1 and 2 of the extension and modernisation of The Memorial Building. This contribution amounted to £94 650. The following figures indicate how the surplus has been utilised, together with comparisons for 1977:

Included in the "Development including Public Relations" figure of £18 677 is a sum of £10 523 which provided stands at Europort 1977 (£6190), Posidonia (£2797) and Hamburg (£1536).

During the year the Quantity Surveyors involved in Phase 1 of the extension and modernisation presented their account for £18 100 which had not been provided for in the 1974 Accounts. It will be seen that a sum of £10 000 has been provided out of this year's surplus against Phase 1A of the extension and modernisation of Mark Lane. Phase 1A is anticipated to be the final stage and involves the transfer of the Marine Engineers Club to a larger floor space, rebuilding the kitchen facilities to cope with the increased Conference activities and making available more rooms for the Conference Centre. The cost of Phase 1A is estimated to be £158 350.

The world-wide recession in the shipping industry has had its effect on the Institute's income in that Advertising Revenue remained virtually the same as last year despite increased rate charges since October 1977. Book sales showed an increase of £4066 this year, being £50 341 against £46 275 in 1976/77. Subscriptions for the M.E.R. and Technical Reports (Transactions) were £40 687, an increase of £1420 over 1976/77. The result from Publications this year is a turn around of £2913 deficit against a surplus of £1182 the previous year.

The Conference Centre has, as anticipated in 1977, made a bigger contribution to revenue. This year the surplus from the Centre is £29 361 compared with £7329 in 1977, which includes £10 442 surplus arising from conferences organised by the Institute on behalf of other parties.

1977/78 has seen further reductions in the rate of inflation in the United Kingdom but the continued recession in shipping is a cause for concern. Both of these areas can, and do, affect the Institute and it is widely anticipated that inflation will soon be on the increase again. For these reasons as much as any other considerations the Institute will continue to watch its finances closely.

#### MARINE MANAGEMENT (HOLDINGS) LIMITED

In accordance with the new Company structure agreed by Council, members will find reports of the three divisions following this general introduction. The Company has had under review various matters of detail and meetings have been held on a monthly basis. Full minutes of the Company have been submitted to Council. Members of the Board of the Company are listed elsewhere in the Annual Report and at the Board Meetings consideration has been given to office accommodation including the library arrangements and various financial matters. In particular the three divisions of the Company have reported on their activities and this has helped to produce substantially more information for consideration by the Board and in due course by the Council.

A copy of the Company's Report and Accounts may be obtained on request.

#### **Management Division**

#### By-Laws

Proposed amendments to the By-Laws affecting particularly the classes of membership of the Institute were approved at the Annual General Meeting in 1978 and submitted to Her Majesty's Privy Council. At the end of the financial year, the Privy Council's decision had not yet been received.

#### Education and Training

Further informal discussions between representatives of the Institute, the General Council of British Shipping and the Southampton College of Higher Education on a proposed CNAA degree course in marine engineering were held. At the year's end, it was expected that the proposals and suggestions made would in due course receive further consideration by the Council.

#### Institute Grants for Education Purposes

During the year, twelve students taking the marine engineering degree courses at the Universities of Newcastle and Surrey, and eleven students taking the Extra First Class Certificate courses at the technical colleges of Hackney (Poplar Centre) and South Shields were in receipt of Institute grants.

#### Membership

It is disappointing that the overall membership figure has fallen again. It is worth noting that the class of Associate Member has seen the highest intake and it is hoped that the number of new members elected will show an upward trend when the new By-Laws become operative. The membership drive mentioned in last year's Annual Report has been postponed to coincide with the introduction of the new By-Laws in the hope of a greater response. The number of resignations remains on a par with last year. The figure quoted for members removed from the Roll is lower than in previous years because the number of members who are in arrears with their subscriptions is on the increase and every effort is being made to retrieve the situation before members are finally deleted. However, it is unlikely that all those concerned will bring their subscriptions up to date and, therefore, a proportionate increase in the numbers removed from the Roll during the next twelve months is to be expected.

The registration fee for automatic receipt of Technical Reports (Transactions) remained at £2.00 per annum.

Mr. L. C. Layman, Cashier, retired from active employment after eleven years of loyal service to the Institute, and Mrs. J. M. Brodie resigned to take up another appointment after ten years' service.

#### **Activities Division**

As a result of the transfer of book sales to the Division as from 1 April 1978, a complete package of marketable products has

emerged.

It is hoped that a major sales drive will not be necessary as the new methods of promotion and selling are aimed at targets which provide the best outlets for specialised lists of publications. The establishment of a closer relationship with other publishers has provided a new basis in which total sales, including those of the Institute's books and papers, can be increased.

All these events attracted increased attendances and the Charity Ball in particular was successful from a financial point of view.

In the interests of comfort for those attending the two Conversaziones the tickets for each event have been limited to 1000. The Activities Division Advisory Committee also decided to reduce the length of cabaret time.

Costs of Social Events have again escalated and every effort is being made to control these, particularly those associated with

the Grosvenor House Hotel.

During the year new arrangements were made for the Presidential Address which took place on 3 October. These included an exhibition and film showing linked with the theme of the Presidential Address, which proved most successful.

A number of other possibilities are being investigated including the showing of important films in the Lecture Theatre on a pro-

grammed basis.

#### CONFERENCE CENTRE

The first six months of lettings proved to be extremely successful, and a revised budget was prepared for the remainder of the year. This revised figure has in fact been exceeded and at the end of the first full year of operation the Conference Centre results indicate the success of this activity. During the year new equipment was purchased and this has enabled us to attract new clients.

The outlook for 1978/79 is good. Bookings at revised rates are excellent and extend as far as 1980.

The resignation of Mrs. G. P. Lato, who will be leaving the Institute's employment for domestic reasons, is reported with regret. Her enthusiasm and hard work have been a major contribution to the success of the Conference Centre as well as to the Division as a whole.

#### **BOOK SALES**

This activity was transferred to the Division as from 1 April 1978. The whole operation has been examined and a new approach is being formulated. As an immediate action, contact has been made with new outlets both in the U.K. and overseas. Some immediate results have been achieved and long term possibilities look favourable.

In many cases the mark up by agents overseas has been high and this has obviously restricted the sales potential of our publications. New outlets for sales are emerging which will eliminate this problem in a number of areas.

CONFERENCES

The tentative programme issued to Council has been completely revised. Previous overseas events have been very much on a trial and error basis. With the break-even stipulation imposed by Institute procedures, setting up events such as Bahrain and Alexandria have been difficult, to say the least.

A new foundation for such operations has now emerged and a revised programme is in the process of construction. ASIA MARINE '79 is a good example of a new type of involvement in which a major exhibition is accompanied by a conference. Such events are due to take place both in the U.K. and overseas and the Institute is responsible for organising the conference. Such conferences have a specific theme, and President's Day is a good example of the attraction which such a planned mixture of exhibition and academic content can produce tion and academic content can produce.

With the backing of the exhibition two factors emerge. Firstly, good speakers with neutral interests can be arranged for the conference, secondly an element of profit is built into the venture which can be applied to relieve the costs of other technical activities.

#### CONCLUSION

The Activities Division has become a vehicle for promoting every aspect of Institute activity. The four main functions generated possibilities for each other as well as breaking new territory for membership, branches and learned society matters.

#### Media Division

The Division is responsible for organising the learned society activities of the Institute such as evening meetings, conferences and the library. The Division is also the Institute publisher but during the year publication sales were transferred to the Activities

#### **EVENING MEETINGS AND CONFERENCES**

#### PUBLICATIONS

#### Marine Engineers Review (M.E.R.)

The quality and presentation of the editorial content was improved to include more contributed articles and the field covered was expanded to include historical and management articles and current awareness items such as synopses and bibliographies. A superintendent engineers' column was also being planned which would include views and comments from seagoing and shore based engineers.

"Postbag" received many letters reminiscing about the past but there was a shortage of letters on technical and commercial

but there was a shortage of letters on technical and commercial subjects involving the shipping industry.

A lively journal depends on support from its readership and it is hoped that readers will keep writing to "Postbag" and provide ideas and material, especially for the Superintendent Engineers' column. Mr. E. G. Semler, the managing editor, would also welcome comments and views on the editorial content.

#### Technical Textbooks

The Institute is always on the lookout for prospective authors

and is able to offer atttactive terms.

During the year *Chemicals in Ships*, edited by L. Kenworthy, was published. The book provided, for the marine engineer, information on chemicals and chemical problems commonly met with in ships, which was not previously available.

#### iii) Preprints and Transactions

Members are reminded that they are entitled on request to Members are reminded that they are entitled on request to a free copy of any paper presented at an evening meeting at the Institute. Preprints are normally available two weeks before the meeting and the transactions, which include the discussion and author's reply, six to nine months after the meeting. Automatic despatch of the transactions of the evening meetings is available for £2 per annum on application to the Institute.

A fee is charged for all conference papers. Plans are being made for a return to typeset publication which greatly improves appearance and legibility at no extra cost.

#### LIBRARY INFORMATION SERVICE

The service, under a qualified librarian, is available to both members and non-members. The library has over 10 000 books and a reference section of 250 marine journals, transactions from and a reference section of 250 marine journals, transactions from sister Institutions, reference books and trade directories. Enquiries could be accepted by telex, telephone, letter or a personal visit. The following facilities are available: book loans, photocopying, provision of references and bibliographies, literature searches.

#### INSTITUTE AWARDS

The Denny Gold Medal for 1978 will not be selected until December 1978.

The Institute's Silver Medal for 1978 will not be selected until December 1978.

#### STAFF

At 30 September, 1978 a total of £98,903 had been paid in respect of interest and facility fees.

The loan from merchant bankers together with accumulated interest, less any payments made in respect thereof in the interim is due to be repaid in eight equal half-yearly instalments commencing June, 1980.

In addition, during the year there has been further expenditure in respect of Phases 1 and 2 which has been paid or is payable by The Institute of Marine Engineers to contractors and other third parties in the amount of £94,650 which together with £98,903 referred to above gives a total of £193,553—see Note 3.

Authorisation has been given for expenditure of £385,000 on Phase 2 of the extension and modernisation of the leasehold property and contracts entered into in respect thereof for total expenditure of £372,600 of which at the date of the Balance Sheet £300,000 (included in £379,832 above) had been expended.

Subsequent to the Balance Sheet date authorisation was given for expenditure of £158,350 on Phase 1A of the extension and modernisation of the leasehold property.

No amortisation has been provided on the leasehold property.

#### Valuation:

In the opinion of Baker Harris Saunders the capital value of the Institute's leasehold interest as at 30 September, 1978, for Balance Sheet purposes, was not less than a figure of £6,000,000. This valuation, dated 19 October, 1978, assumes that the property will continue to be held by the Institute as an investment and to provide accommodation for the conducting of the day to day business of The Institute of Marine Engineers.

#### 6) Quoted Securities

These consisted of Gilt Edged Stocks, British and American Fixed Interest Stocks and Equities at cost. They have been valued at 30 September, 1978 at middle market prices and in the case of those held abroad their Sterling equivalent has been calculated in accordance with the official rate of exchange ruling at that date. On this basis the market value at 30 September, 1978 was £30,738 above their cost (1977 £36,038 above).
