Annual Report of the Council and Accounts for the year ended 30 September 1982

The year now reported on has been dominated by consideration of the position of the profession consequent upon the formation of the Engineering Council and the various functions and responsibilities to be attributed to that organisation.

In certain areas of activity, mainly registration, the establishment of the Council's facilities will mean the surrender of C.E.I.'s equivalent duties. Towards the end of the year the method by which this might be done has been under careful scrutiny in that it would probably involve the surrender of the C.E.I. Charter or that element of it which prescribes the attainments necessary for the tille of Chartered Engineer to be accorded to members of the profession.

A substantial amount of discussion has taken place within which one objective was to ensure that in these changes the responsibilities of the institutions would continue and the facilities available from those institutions would continue to be used.

Other significant matters which have emerged during the year include a sadly continuing decline in membership which could be attributed to the depressed state of the marine industry, stricter application of the By-Laws in relation to the payment of subscriptions and because of the substantial number of Corporate Members who allowed their membership to fade away. Statistically it has been encouraging to see the figures made up in the substantial growth in the Associate Member category (the only one to show a net positive figure). This is not the whole answer, as consideration of the effect of recruitment through the higher echelons of membership as a result of changes of the C.E.I./Engineering Council handover are difficult to quantify.

All of this means that the Council must give time to consideration of the future, both of the Institute as a qualifying body and a learned society.

Other important matters include a most favourable financial position which, with a rent review due in the forthcoming twelve months, must be assumed as beneficial to this position. All of this has resulted in an ability to meet all requirements during the present year with regard to the outstanding loans to the Merchant Bank and the Church Commissioners.

Negotiations continue with The Royal Institution of Naval Architects and are making, it can be said, progress. A timetable has been established which hopefully will bring about the act of fusion sometime in the Spring of 1985. The intervening processes will necessitate consultations with the members as to the principle of the proposed fusion and steps have been taken to see what form this might take.

In the section of the Report relating to Divisions and Branches mention has been made of the visit to London by Mr. Crosby, Vice-President, Australia/New Zealand Division. The Chairman and the Secretary of the Hong Kong Joint Branch also paid a brief visit to the Institute during the summer and the opportunity was taken to discuss various matters of concern to the Hong Kong Branch. It is undoubtedly worthwhile for officers from far-flung areas of the Institute's activities to have the opportunity to come to headquarters and see how the Institute is run at source and to meet those responsible for this function.

The Canadian position on which so much hope had been built for the dual membership concept is such that aspirations in this direction have not materialised for a number of technical reasons. All members of the Institute resident in Canada have been acquainted individually of the position, coupled with a statement to the effect that it is hoped that something of the services which the Institute provided during the period of the existence of the Canadian Division will be able to be resuscitated. Detailed reference to these matters are made later in the Report.

OFFICERS AND MEMBERS OF COUNCIL

Commander E. C. Pidgeon succeeded Mr. J. McNaught as President and Mr. B. Hildrew was elected Deputy President. Mr. J. McNaught was elected to serve as Honorary Treasurer. Mr. A. H. Stobbs was co-opted to fill the casual vacancy of Fellow and Captain M. A. Vallis, RN, was appointed to succeed Rear Admiral P. G. Hammersley, CB, O.B.E., as Honorary Vice-President for the Royal Navy.

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COUNCIL

The Council met on six occasions during the year and a wide variety of subjects was discussed, some of which had been considered by Committees of the Council. The following is a brief summary of the work undertaken by the Council during the year.

Office Bearers

Nominations for office holders of the Institute were approved and also representatives on outside bodies were appointed.

By-Laws

As mentioned in the annual report last year, an Extraordinary General Meeting was held on the 19 October 1981 at which the President made a statement giving the reason for the necessity to rescind the alterations to the By-Laws approved by the Annual General Meeting in 1978. The President further explained that the Council of Engineering Institutions (C.E.I.) had again indicated that the proposed alterations and amendments to the By-laws, circulated to members in August 1981, relating to the membership structure would necessitate changes in the By-Laws of C.E.I. which it was not prepared to sanction and it followed that in view of this, approval by the Privy Council was unlikely to be granted. The President, therefore, had no alternative but to recommend that the Extraordinary General Meeting be adjourned sine die. The motion for this course of action was approved by the meeting.

Subsequently, with Council approval, the alterations and amendments to the By-laws, with the exception of those relating to the membership structure, were submitted to the members at the Annual General Meeting in March 1982. These were approved by the Privy Council and became operative as from 6 August 1982.

Engineering Council

The Department of Industry Draft Charter, referred to in last year's Annual Report, was given the Royal Consent in October 1981. The Engineering Council was duly launched with Sir Kenneth Corfield being appointed Chairman, and subsequently Dr. Kenneth Miller appointed Director General. The Engineering Council is made up of representatives from Industry, Education and Employers.

The many subjects under discussion included the question of Groupings for professional institutions and also the establishment of the Register of Engineers. A decision was reached by the Engineering Council in favour of four Groups and it is yet not known the group in which this Institute will be included.

With regard to the Engineering Council's requirement under its Charter to establish and maintain a Register for the purposes of registering by stages professional engineers, technician engineers, and engineering technicians. the Engineering Council expressed the desire to take over the existing H. R. B. Register and stated that those currently on the Register would retain their existing status. To this end, discussions commenced between the Engineering Council and C.E.I. and at an Extraordinary General Meeting of C.E.I. the President, as the Institute's representative, supported the special resolution seeking approval to change C.E.I.'s Royal Charter and By-laws to permit the use of a poll as an alternative to a general meeting in confirming special resolutions. Thereby enabling all Chartered Engineers to express an opinion. C.E.I. regarded this as an essential first stage in the process of a transfer of its powers to the Engineering Council. This is also likely to include the examination function currently undertaken by C.E.I.

On the 30 September the Engineering Council issued a policy statement a summary of which will be published in the November issue of the Bulletin. The consequences of the establishment of the Engineering Council have been fully discussed and debated by the Institute's Council which considers the interest of Marine Engineers to be of paramount importance within the framework of the Engineering Council. Members may rest assured that their Council will maintain its vigorous policy of negotiation.

R.I.N.A./I.MAR.E. Merger

The Council at its meeting in April resolved in principle to merge with the Royal Institution of Naval Architects. The Joint Standing Committee originally established to carry out preliminary discussions on the merger was reconstituted as a Joint Negotiating Committee.

Subsequently, working groups were established to consider procedure and programmes, charter and by-laws, finance, management and administration, and these Groups are now in the course of reporting to the Joint Negotiating Committee. A statement is due to appear in the journals of both Societies later in the year informing members as to the progress achieved.

The Future of the Institute and its Administration

The Council has for some time past been concerned with the future of the Institute and its administration, with particular reference to professional standards, objectives and activities. To enable a study to be carried out the Board of Marine Management (Holdings) Limited was charged with the task of setting up a working party to examine and report on the subject. A preliminary report was accepted by the Council in August 1982 and the working party is now in the process of finalising detailed recommendations showing the future pattern for the Institute, taking into account the proposed merger with The Royal Institution of Naval Architects.

Council Representation on External Organisations

The Institute continued to be represented on external organisations including the Council of Engineering Institutions and regular reports were received by Council.

The Council decided to continue the Institute's representation on the British Committee for E.C.O.R. (Engineering Committee on Oceanic Resources) and agreed to set up an Offshore Engineering Section jointly with The Royal Institution of Naval Architects. This decision resulted from a recommendation by the Institute's E.C.O.R. representative and the suggestion made by a member at the last Annual General Meeting.

South Atlantic Appeal Fund

Members will no doubt be pleased to learn that the Institute made a donation of $\pounds 2,000$ to the South Atlantic Appeal Fund.

DIVISIONS AND BRANCHES

Australia/New Zealand Division

Mr. D. W. Crosby, Vice-President, Australia/New Zealand Division, whilst on a visit to London, took the opportunity of attending the Council meeting in June and informed the Council that the Australia/New Zealand Division was progressing well and was in favour of the proposed merger with RINA.

The Division extended an invitation to the President and Director and Secretary to attend the Divisional Council meeting which is being held in Christchurch, New Zealand in November 1982.

Branches

The Branch Honorary Officers meeting held last March was well attended and the following were amongst the subjects discussed—membership applications, subscriptions, branch membership, publicity, MER/Bulletin and Branch Committees. The increase in the basic branch grant on a sliding scale came into effect this year and proved advantageous to smaller branches.

Headquarters continued to supply the usual support services to Branches during the year.

Southern Joint Branch reported the death in December 1971 of Mr. T. W. Paradise and Council agreed to contribute towards a memorial prize to be awarded annually, jointly with Vosper Thornycroft and RINA, to the best apprentice at Vosper Thornycroft.

Canada

The dual membership concept referred to in last year's Annual Report has been pursued enthustiastically by Council and was the subject of much correspondence with the Canadian Institute. It is regretted that negotiations, which extended over some considerable time, were unsuccessful. In view of this lack of success, Council has indicated its desire to provide enhanced services to all members of The Institute of Marine Engineers resident in Canada.

FINANCE AND ACCOUNTS

The Revenue Account on page 14 reflects the following:

- a) The excess of Expenditure on Membership Services over Income from Members' Subscriptions was equivalent to approximately £10.00 per capita, an increase of £3.50 per capita over 1981.
- b) During the year a further two repayments of principal (total £204,902) were made to the merchant bankers on the Unsecured Loan. Interest on this loan amounted to £62,733 in the year under review and this has been charged to the Revenue Account.
- c) The surplus for the year before appropriations amounted to £362,083.

The Appropriations Account on page 16 shows that after making appropriations of $\pounds 347,470$ there was a net surplus of $\pounds 31,782$ available to be carried forward.

The Reserve Fund therefore stood at £211,013 at 30th September 1982.

The Balance Sheet on page 17 demonstrates the increasing value of the net assets of the Institute which in 1982 were $\pounds 2,237,370$ up $\pounds 383,914$.

MARINE MANAGEMENT (HOLDINGS) LIMITED

The affairs of the Company are reported under the headings of each of the three Divisions. The profits of the Company are transferred to The Institute of Marine Engineers in full by covenant.

Activities Division

The two profit making operations carried out by the Division have continued to develop. Despite the recession, and problems such as the rail strike, the Conference Centre and Book and Publication Sales performance was in excess of the budgeted figures.

Each activity is now commented upon :--

Conference Centre

The first full year of usage of the first floor as a Conference Centre provided an indication of the maximum profitability which might be achieved. During the year there was an obvious diminution of speculative conference package deal bookings due to the reluctance of employers to send people on non-productive seminars. This short-fall has been replaced by up-market bookings for next year which involve full-scale banqueting catering with a profit margin far in excess of the normal conference package.

Book and Publication Sales

Due to the recession in the UK maritime industry, sales in this country dropped dramatically. This reduction was more than rectified by overseas orders generated by the Book and Publication Sales Department. One major example of such operations was a $\pm 10,000$ order negotiated through IMO, with the possibility of some forty similar orders which are under consideration. The Department continued with its supplies to a number of maritime academies overseas, and it is in these areas where the demand now exists.

Such orders are not merely profitable financial operations. They bring with them a considerable public relations impact which brings the Institute's existence to the attention of useful contacts in every maritime country.

The Book and Publication Sales Department is no longer a purely sales function, but provides advice and recommendations for the most up to date sources of printed information, and is very much a service to members.

Social Events

A

These have been very much affected by the recession, and many of our regular hosts were forced to reduce their attendance numbers. In some instances their choice was for the Annual Dinner rather than the Conversazione.

During the year, responsibility for the Charity Ball was transferred to the Guild of Benevolence, and this will be reported on under the section dealing with the Guild.

Social Events are under close examination in view of the constantly escalating costs imposed by hotels in the West End, and this is a matter of considerable importance, as the aim has always been for a break-even financial outcome.

Overseas Activities

These continued to expand, and regular contact was maintained with approximately one hundred high level contacts. In many instances the link was established through an Institute member being either a national of the country concerned or an ex-patriate member working in the area.

It must be stated that the link with I.M.O. through the Publication Sales Service was a major contributory factor in what has been achieved. It is unusual for a week to go by without an overseas visitor arriving in reception with some request or query.

People's Republic of China

Negotiations continued with the Chinese Society of Naval Architecture and Marine Engineering, and an invitation was received to join them in their fortieth anniversary celebrations in Shanghai in November 1983. The Hong Kong Joint Branch must be thanked for the part they played in developing this relationship.

Monaco

Preliminary discussions mentioned in last year's annual report have resulted in the Institute organizing an international maritime conference which will take place in December 1983 in the Monte Carlo Convention Centre.

E.E.C. Marine Transport Research Project

During the year, the Institute became involved in an interesting E.E.C. project which initially concerned the design of economic ships to trade on specific routes. The basic aim was to produce a European Community designed ship/ships which could be an answer to the Far East shipbuilding industry. This matter is being actively progressed.

Management Division

Subscriptions

The question of subscriptions was discussed by the Council at length and in view of the increase in subsidy to members it was considered necessary to raise subscriptions as follows. It was also decided that there should be a differential subscription rate between corporate and non-corporate members. As a result the rates of subscriptions for the twelve months from 1 October 1982 will be:—

Membership

Bi-monthly meetings were held to scrutinise applications for elections and transfers, each application being considered entirely on its own merit, thus ensuring that standards laid down in the By-Laws were being maintained.

It was encouraging to note that the total number of elections for the year had increased. Election to the Corporate class of membership increased in the class of Fellow by 6 to 34 (1981 28) and also increased in the class of Member by 16 to 99 (1981 83). Despite

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an overall increase in elections there was a decrease in the class of Consociate by 48 to 93 (1981 141). In the class of Associate Member the steady increase continued by 23 to 264 (1981 241). The number of resignations had decreased by 54 to 178 (1981 232). The number of members removed from the Roll for the non-payment of sub-scription had increased overall by 332 to 1052 (1981 720).

This year a further breakdown of membership figures has been provided which it is hoped will prove of interest to the membership (see pages 10 and 11). The membership figures for India, Canada and South Africa are 1,140 (711 full 429 dual), 523, and 237 respectively.

Members are once again reminded that if they undertake to support an applicant for membership of the Institute by acting as proposer or seconder they must verify the information given on the application form. Full information is required as to the applicant's academic qualifications, training and experience i.e. full details of sea service and professional job responsibility.

All application forms must be accompanied by the entry fee and first annual subscription.

Education and Training

The post of Education and Training Officer was advertised in the national press and as a result interviews are now taking place and it is hoped that an appointment will be made shortly.

Every endeavour has been made to maintain the Education and Training function and the Professional Affairs & Education Committee met on several occasions. During the year a number of Training Schemes were considered amongst which the Lloyd's Register of Shipping Graduate Training Scheme for Chartered Engineer status was approved by the Institute.

The Institute continued to administer the Lloyd's Register of Shipping Scholarship Award and also its own awards and prizes. Educational grants were also awarded to students reading for degrees in Marine/Mechanical Engineering and also to those preparing for the D.O.T. Extra 1st Class Certificate.

In addition, the Institute's accreditation programme progressed and members will be pleased to learn that the Institute's submission to C.E.I. for the D.O.T. Extra Ist Class Certificate to receive continued exemption from the C.E.I. examination was approved, with a recommendation that a further review be made not later than 1986.

Memorial Building

The maintenance of the building is constantly under review and work has now begun on the refurbishment of the Mark Lane lift which it is hoped will be completed by late Autumn.

A President's office has been established on the second floor and plans are also underway to improve the air conditioning system in the Conference Centre.

At the request of members the memorial plaque erected in memory of the Engine Room Staff of the s.s. TITANIC was resited in the foyer, together with the Books of Remembrance containing the names of those serving in the Royal and Merchant Navies who gave their lives in the Second World War.

Media Division

The Division is responsible for organising the Learned Society activities of the Institute such as evening meetings, conferences and the library information service. The Division is also the Institute's publisher and publishes the Bulletin, MER, transactions and text books. Work can be undertaken in any of these fields on a repayment basis.

Publications available to members

Bulletin (published on the 24th of the preceding month).

The Bulletin is sent free without request to every member. MER (published on the 10th of the month).

The MER is sent free on request *only* to those members who have completed and returned a reader survey form.

Preprints

Preprints are available two weeks before the meeting.

i) Evening Meetings

Members can register for the automatic despatch of each paper when available by writing to the Conference Officer. Alternatively single papers may be requested by telephone or letter.

ii) Conferences

Bound copies of the conference preprints are sold to delegates and to those who are unable to attend.

Transactions

Transactions which include the paper, the discussion and the author's reply are published six to eight months after the event.

i) Evening Meetings

One copy of each paper will be sent free on request. By writing to the Institute members can either register for the automatic receipt of all papers or they can apply for individual papers after they have been advertised in the MER.

ii) Conferences

Conference volumes containing the papers, the discussion and the authors' replies are sold to members and the public; the proceeds helping to offset the cost of the Conference.

Publications Policy

The Bulletin, the MER and the Transactions each has a separate role.

The Bulletin is the only publication which is sent to every member without request and is therefore the vehicle for keeping in touch with the membership; hence the reason why it mainly contains Institute and Branch news. It is also an economic vehicle for a Branch to communicate with its members by means of a Branch insertion in the Bulletin.

The MER was started in 1967 under the title of the Marine Engineers Journal with the aim of producing a lively journal which would not attempt to duplicate the detailed technical papers available in the transactions; it was also to have advertising. Since the birth of the Bulletin in 1981 the MER has only been sent to members on request. The editorial is therefore a com-promise between the requirements of the Institute, the readers not all of whom are members and the advertisers who make an important financial contribution. Like most prestige journals MER is divided into multi-page articles and short news items; the latter appearing in self-contained sections under various headings to make it easier for each reader to find what interests him most. This is the best compromise between in depth treatment and covering a large number of items; the latter increases the chance that every reader will find something of interest. The MER reader survey form although unpopular with members provides the editor with useful information about the readership, allows readers to comment on the MER and most important from the advertisers point of view gives the publication a large "requested" circulation.

Over the last few years the cost of postage has increased more rapidly than other costs. In the case of the MER a copy now costs 29p to print and 27p to post hence the reason for economy and why the journal is on request only.

- Training and Distance Learning Onboard Ships. Joint with the Merchant Navy Training Board. 106 registrants.

The Papers Committee would like to receive suggestions for papers and conferences.

MER and Bulletin

This was the first complete year in which the MER and the Bulletin were sent out separately by accelerated surface post overseas, and bulk air mail in Europe. A further reader survey was carried out to update the last one, now over two years old. The results show that a small minority of members still object to having to fill in the request form for MER and they have been promised no further such MER forms for three years. Many members have commented favourably on MER and hardly any unfavourably. Many constructive suggestions have been received including a few complaints of late delivery, almost all of them from the Indian Ocean area.

The outstanding achievement of the year has been the increase of advertising revenue from $\pounds 118,000$ to about $\pounds 150,000$ in the face of considerable difficulties due to staff shortages and the depressed economic conditions. For the first time for several years the increase is well ahead of inflation.

On the other hand printing charges have been kept constant by negotiation in the face of inflation. Postage charges, however, have increased considerably.

Once again the editor would welcome far more cooperation from readers in the form of news items from their own countries and organisations; Branch news; letters to the editor and offers of articles. He also invited details of when publications arrive more than a month after publication (MER 10th, Bulletin 24th of the preceding month).

Candidates for Major Awards in the U.K.

Members were invited to submit names for major awards such as the annual Stanley Gray £1,000 prize and the MacRobert £25,000 award. There must be suitable candidates who have been involved either in the design of new ships or offshore work in the North Sea which the Institute does not know about.

The Institute's Stanley Gray award is made to the engineer or scientist achieving the highest distinction in a marine technology subject; an achievement, a significant technical paper or a book completed within the last 5 years qualify for the award.

Marine Text Books

The Institute would like to hear from potential authors and receive suggestions for new titles.

Library

The Library has developed further this year with over 1,000 new books added to stock. The new material reflects the growing interest in the commercial aspects of as well as technological developments in shipping. Almost half the library's book stock is now less than 4 years old.

Cayzer Irvine Shipping Limited generously donated a collection of technical reports to the Institute's library.

Technical Information Service

Automated Information Retrieval

It is appropriate that 1982, Information Technology Year, saw considerable technical advances of direct benefit to the information service. The Euronet telecommunications network is gradually being replaced by linked national networks which give wider coverage. The Institute's terminal now provides access to 42 computers and 360 databases in Europe alone. These databases contain a total of 60 million computer records and 3 million statistics on data trends.

The use of European services will result in significantly reduced costs. New European data services include the Dutch ship technology database "Marna", a database of ship descriptions entitled "Shipdes" and the joint Swedish and Norwegian "Ship Abstracts" database.

However the American Dialog system continues to be the largest supplier of computer data to the information service, but it is likely that European sources will be able to supply most of the Institute's requirements in the near future.

International Directory of Consultants and Technic.' Services

The first edition of the directory will be published at the end of 1982 and will contain entries from 120 consultants, testing laboratories and research and development organisations. Members wishing to submit entries for the second edition should contact the information service staff in the library.

Consultancy

Members of the information service staff were appointed as consultants to J. P. Kenny and Partners Ltd., to establish a company information department. This service is offered to other companies which are experiencing difficulties in obtaining or handling information. A fee is charged for the service.
